To happen this year: All KS2 will be attending swimming lessons this year. Each class will receive 5/6 sessions a week, on a Rota of two groups going per week. They will focus on developing fundamental skills that were learnt in their previous years of swimming, such as front crawl and backstroke. Year 3 will be learning the key skills of swimming as it is their first year of swimming. They will practice fundamental skills such as learning to float and swimming with floats and other buoyancy aids.
